## Formula 2020 season

Formula 1 team owner turned regulator Ross Brawn is as eager to start the 2020 F1 season as anyone, but in this time of crisis, he admits to being too tensioned to start racing could cost lives. He also set October as F1's absolute must-start deadline because of rules that set eight Grands Prix as the minimum number over which the world championship can be decided. Eight races are the minimum, we can have a world championship, [according to] the FIA statutes. We could reach eight races starting in October, said Brawn. Formula 1 season consists of several races, or grands prix, held on circuits around the world. The results of each race are combined to determine two annual championships: the Formula One World Drivers Championship and the Formula One Constructors Championship. The former celebrates individual performance, and celebrates the team's performance – and, ultimately, the vehicle's performance. The first car races were on public roads, not permanent circuits. Public pressure forced racing cars off public roads and on tracks designed exclusively for sport. Today, the only Formula 1 race that stays on the streets is Monaco. All other races take place on purpose-built tracks designed to address the needs of high-speed racing. Advertising any track, be it street or purpose built, requires its own unique strategy. Monaco, as it is a tight street race, forces drivers to slow down significantly. In fact Monaco is one of the slowest races in a Formula 1 season. It is also very narrow and bumpy, and it is not uncommon for cars to communicate with barriers. Additional wings are also used on cars that race in Monaco to make sure enough downforce is created. Because overtaking is almost impossible, ensuring a good grid position is absolutely essential to secure victory in Monaco (we'll get into grid positioning later). The points system decides on the champions of the season. The driver earns points based on how he places in each race. The driver with points at the end of the season are crowned champion. The following table summarizes how points are awarded. Teams earn points using the same system, except that they get to put together the results of both drivers. So if two drivers determine the team to finish first and third in a particular race, the team earns 16 points. The number of races per season may vary as tracks are added or stopped all the time. For example, in 2007, the FIA decided that Germany would no longer be able to run two grands prix and that Japan's Fuji Speedway would be the formula 1 race for the first time in 30 years. Usually, however, the season consists of 15 to 17 races, with most of the races concentrated in Europe. Winning Formula One brings prestige – and financial rewards. The driver's salary is determined by his contract with the team. This is usually a flat fee and requires a driver to participate in a certain number of test sessions and make a certain number of appearances on behalf of his sponsors. On top of that basic salary, a driver can earn a bonus – maybe \$150,000 or so – for winning races. He can also earn a bonus for winning the driver's championship. Then there's merchandising and approvals. Michael Schumacher, who earns about \$30 million a year, is one of the highest-paid athletes in the world. Of course, it's not just the manager who gets the money. Formula 1 teams also enjoy the victory. The amount a team earns from sports television rights depends on where it ends up in the title chase. Winners of each grand prix get a trophy. Then there's the championship trophy, which is given to the driver and team with the most points at the end of the season. The championship trophy is presented at the FIA awards ceremony in Monte Carlo in December. Each grand prix is the main company for the team.
